

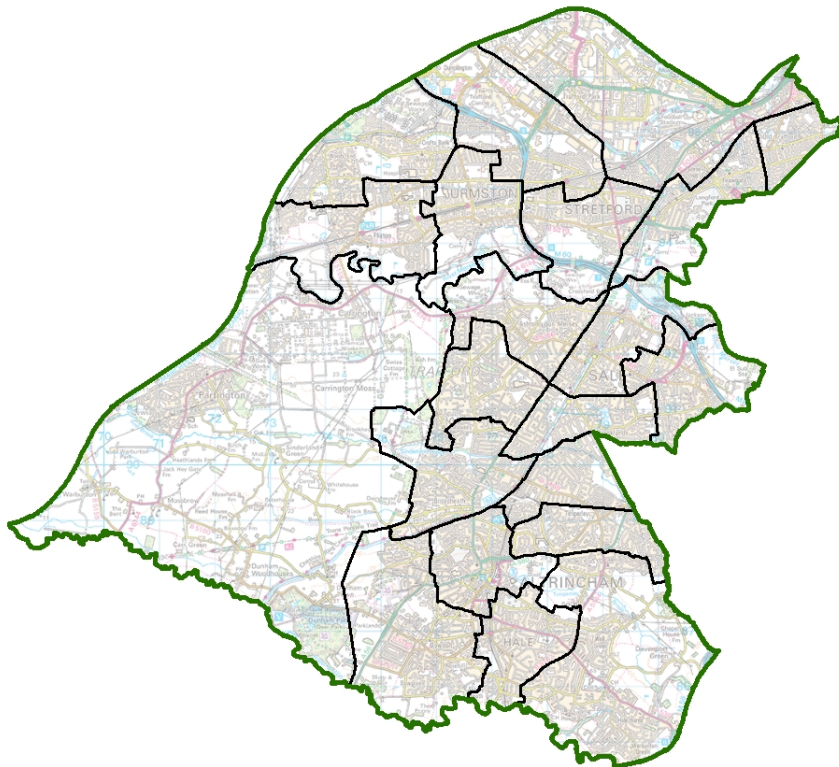
News Release from the Local Government Boundary Commission for England

Have your say on a new political map for Trafford Council

New boundaries are being proposed for council wards in Trafford Council.

The Local Government Boundary Commission wants to hear what residents and local organisations think about the proposals. A 10-week consultation on the proposals will run until 7 February 2022.

The Commission is the independent body that draws these boundaries. It is reviewing Trafford to make sure councillors will represent about the same number of electors, and that ward arrangements will help the council work effectively.

The Commission has published proposals for changes to Trafford. It is proposing that there should be 21 wards and three councillors per ward. 20 out of the 21 wards will have their boundaries changed.

Proposed changes include:

- The M60 will be used as the boundary between Stretford and Urmston wards
- Carrington, Partington, Dunham Massey and Warburton parishes will be united in a single ward. This will also allow some electors previously in Bucklow-St Martin's ward to be placed in either Ashton upon Mersey or Manor wards. This decision was based on input from the local community.

Launching the consultation Professor Colin Mellors, Chair of the Commission, said:

“We want people in Trafford to help us.

“We have drawn up proposals for new wards in Trafford. We want to make sure these new electoral arrangements reflect communities. We also want them to be easy to understand and convenient for local people.

“Residents and local organisations can help us do that. We would like them to let us know whether they agree with our proposals before we take final decisions.

“It's easy to get involved. Go to our website. Or you can e-mail or write to us.

“Just tell us what you think and give us some details why you think that. It's really simple, so do get involved”

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body accountable to Parliament. It recommends fair electoral and boundary arrangements for local authorities in England. In doing so, it aims to:

- Make sure that, within an authority, each councillor represents a similar number of electors
- Create boundaries that are appropriate, and reflect community ties and identities
- Deliver reviews informed by local needs, views and circumstances
