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Summary

Who we are

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE) is an independent body set up by Parliament. We are not part of government or any political party. We are accountable to Parliament through a committee of MPs chaired by the Speaker of the House of Commons.

Our main role is to carry out electoral reviews of local authorities throughout England.

Electoral review

An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for a local authority. A local authority's electoral arrangements decide:

- How many councillors are needed
- How many wards or electoral divisions should there be, where are their boundaries and what should they be called
- How many councillors should represent each ward or division

Why Knowsley?

We have conducted an electoral review of Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council, following a request by the Council in order to consider council size. Knowsley currently has high levels of electoral inequality where some councillors represent many more or many fewer voters than others. This means that the value of each vote in borough council elections varies depending on where you live in Knowsley. Overall, 29% of wards currently have a variance of more than 10% from the average for the borough and one ward, Longview, has a variance of 23%.

Our proposals for Knowsley

Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council currently has 63 councillors. Based on the evidence we received during the review, we consider that a council size of 45 members will ensure the Council can discharge its roles and responsibilities effectively.

Electoral arrangements

Our final recommendations propose that Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council's 45 councillors should represent 15 three-member wards. None of our proposed wards would have an electoral variance of greater than 10% from the average for Knowsley by 2020.

We have finalised our recommendations for electoral arrangements for Knowsley.

1 Introduction

1 This electoral review was conducted following our decision to review Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council's electoral arrangements following a request made by the Council and to ensure that the number of voters represented by each councillor is approximately the same across the borough.

What is an electoral review?

2 Our three main considerations in conducting an electoral review are set out in legislation¹ and are to:

- Improve electoral equality by equalising the number of electors each councillor represents
- Reflect community identity
- Provide for effective and convenient local government

3 Our task is to strike the best balance between them when making our recommendations. Our powers, as well as the guidance we have provided for electoral reviews and further information on the review process, can be found on our website at <u>www.lgbce.org.uk</u>

Consultation

4 We wrote to the Council as well as other interested parties, inviting the submission of proposals on council size. We then held two periods of consultation: firstly on warding patterns for the Council and secondly on our draft recommendations. The submissions received during our consultations have informed our final recommendations.

How will the recommendations affect you?

5 The recommendations will determine how many councillors will serve on the Council. They will also decide which ward you vote in, which other communities are in that ward and, in some instances, which parish council ward you vote in. Your ward name may also change, as may the names of parish or town council wards in the area. The names or boundaries of parishes will not change as a result of our recommendations.

6 The Local Government Boundary Commission for England is an independent body set up by Parliament under the Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Act 2009.

2 Analysis and final recommendations

7 Legislation states that our recommendations are not intended to be based solely on the existing number of electors² in an area, but also on estimated changes in the number and distribution of electors likely to take place over a five-year period from the date of our final recommendations. We must also try to recommend strong, clearly identifiable boundaries for the wards we put forward at the end of the review.

8 In reality, the achievement of absolute electoral fairness is unlikely to be attainable and there must be a degree of flexibility. However, our approach is to keep variances and the number of electors each councillor represents to a minimum.

9 In seeking to achieve electoral fairness, we work out the average number of electors per councillor by dividing the electorate by the number of councillors as shown in the table below.

10 Under our final recommendations, none of our proposed wards will have electoral variances of greater than 10% from the average for the borough by 2020. We are therefore satisfied that we have achieved good levels of electoral fairness for Knowsley.

11 Additionally, in circumstances where we propose to divide a parish between borough wards or county divisions, we are required to divide it into parish wards so that each parish ward is wholly contained within a single borough ward or county division. We cannot make amendments to the external boundaries of parishes as part of an electoral review.

12 These recommendations cannot affect the external boundaries of Knowsley Metropolitan Borough or result in changes to postcodes. Nor is there any evidence that the recommendations will have an adverse effect on local taxes, house prices, or car and house insurance premiums. The proposals do not take account of parliamentary constituency boundaries, and we are not, therefore, able to take into account any representations which are based on these issues.

Electorate figures

14 As prescribed in the Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Act 2009, the Council submitted electorate forecasts for 2020, a period five years on from the scheduled publication of our final recommendations in 2015. These forecasts were broken down to polling district levels and projected an increase in the electorate of approximately 5.6% to 2020. Growth is forecast across the authority with the largest increases forecast for Prescot and the west of the authority.

15 Having considered the information provided by the Council, we are satisfied that the projected figures are the best available at the present time and these figures form the basis of our final recommendations.

Council size

16 Prior to consultation, Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council submitted a proposal for a council size of 45. We are content that the Council has sufficiently demonstrated that the authority can operate efficiently and effectively under this council size and ensure effective representation of local residents. We were therefore minded to adopt a council size of 45 as the basis of this electoral review and invited proposals or warding arrangements based on this number of councillors.

17 In response to consultation on warding patterns, a submission from Knowsley & Prescot Liberal Democrats proposed a pattern of wards based on a council size of 36 members. We consider that there was insufficient evidence within the proposal to justify such a large departure from the previously agreed council size, and that the proposal put forward by the Council provided the best case for a new council size for Knowsley.

18 In response to consultation on our draft recommendations we received nine submissions in support of a council size of 45. We have based our final recommendations on a council size of 45 elected members.

Warding patterns

19 During consultation on warding patterns, we received 66 submissions in total. These included a borough-wide proposal from the Council in addition to the proposal put forward by Knowsley & Prescot Liberal Democrats described in paragraph 17. The remainder of the submissions provided localised comments for warding arrangements in particular areas of the borough.

20 Having carefully considered the proposals received, we were of the view that the pattern of wards proposed by the Council resulted in good levels of electoral equality in most areas of the authority and generally used clearly identifiable boundaries, although we did have some concerns with the Council's proposals for Halewood, Prescot and Whiston. The Council's proposals received a significant level of support from members of the public, local organisations and some of the town councils in Knowsley.

21 Our draft recommendations were for 15 three-member wards. We considered that our draft recommendations would provide for good electoral equality while

reflecting community identities and interests where we had received such evidence during consultation.

Draft recommendations

22 We received 72 submissions during consultation on our draft recommendations. These are detailed in Appendix B. The majority of submissions received were in support of our draft recommendations in their entirety, including a submission from Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council. We received localised submissions commenting on areas across the borough, most notably in regard to the areas of Prescot, Whiston, Halewood and Kirkby.

23 Having considered the wealth of evidence gathered during the consultation on our draft recommendations, we have proposed some amendments to our draft recommendations based on the evidence received.

Whiston & Cronton

24 We received 14 submissions that commented on our proposals for this area. Under our draft recommendations we proposed a ward named Whiston, which we have amended to Whiston & Cronton under our final recommendations. We have also made a minor amendment to the boundary between this area and the neighbouring Halewood North ward. Under our final recommendations the boundary runs along the A5300; as a result the area between the A5300 and the A5080 (Cronton Road) is therefore included in our Whiston & Cronton ward.

Halewood North and Halewood South

25 Four submissions were made in regard to Halewood. As per paragraph 24, we have made one minor amendment to the boundary between Halewood and the neighbouring Whiston & Cronton ward. Based on the evidence received we consider that the boundary between our proposed Halewood North and Halewood South wards provides the best balance between our statutory criteria and, subject to the amendment outlined above, we confirm our draft recommendations for Halewood as final.

Prescot North and Prescot South

26 We received five submissions that commented on our draft recommendations for the Prescot area. Based on the evidence received we have made a minor amendment to the boundary between Prescot South ward and the neighbouring Whiston & Cronton ward, so that the boundary between the two runs to the north of Whiston Hospital rather than to the south. Aside from this minor change we confirm our draft recommendations for Prescot North and Prescot South as final.

Final recommendations

27 The tables on pages 9–15 detail our final recommendations for each area of Knowsley. Where we have moved away from our draft recommendations, we have outlined how the proposed warding arrangements reflect the three statutory criteria of:

- Equality of representation
- Reflecting community interests and identities
- Providing for convenient and effective local government

Based on the evidence we received during the consultation we have also made a minor amendment to the boundary between this area and the neighbouring Halewood North ward. Under our draft recommendations the boundary between these two wards ran along the Cronton parish boundary. As part of our final recommendations we have moved this boundary to the west so that it instead runs along the A5300. As a result the area between the A5300 and the A5080 (Cronton Road) is therefore included in our Whiston & Cronton ward.
 We have also made a minor amendment to the boundary between Whiston & Cronton ward and Prescot South ward. Under our draft recommendations the boundary between these two wards ran to the south of Whiston Hospital. As part of our final recommendations we have decided to move this boundary to the north of the hospital, placing the hospital in Whiston & Cronton ward. Subject to these amendments we confirm our draft recommendations for this ward as final.

				Whilst there was some support for the Council's original proposal for Halewood that was put forward during the consultation on warding arrangements, we considered the representations received including those opposing and supporting the draft recommendations. We consider that our proposed Halewood North ward has identifiable boundaries and provides the best balance between the statutory criteria. Therefore, subject to the minor amendment described above, we confirm our draft recommendations for Halewood North as final.

As outlined above, we received some submissions opposing our draft recommendations and supporting an alternative proposal. Having considered the representations we consider that our draft recommendations provide for the best balance between the statutory criteria. Therefore, subject to the minor amendment described above, we confirm our draft
recommendations for Halewood South as final.

Final recommendation

Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council should comprise 45 councillors serving 15 three-member wards. The details and names are shown in Table A1 and illustrated on the large maps accompanying this report.

Parish electoral arrangements

29 As part of an electoral review, we are required to have regard to the statutory criteria set out in Schedule 2 to the Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Act 2009 (the 2009 Act). The Schedule provides that if a parish is to be divided between different wards it must also be divided into parish wards, so that each parish ward lies wholly within a single ward. We cannot recommend changes to the external boundaries of parishes as part of an electoral review.

30 Under the 2009 Act we only have the power to make changes to parish electoral arrangements where these are as a direct consequence of our recommendations for principal authority warding arrangements. However, Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council has powers under the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007 to conduct community governance reviews to effect changes to parish electoral arrangements.

31 As a result of our proposed ward boundaries and having regard to the statutory criteria set out in schedule 2 to the 2009 Act, we are providing revised parish electoral arrangements for Halewood, Knowsley, Prescot and Whiston. We have given consideration to our proposed ward boundaries and the existing ward boundaries, but have not taken into account the existing parish ward boundaries.

32 As a result of our proposed ward boundaries and having regard to the statutory criteria set out in schedule 2 to the 2009 Act, we are providing revised parish electoral arrangements for Halewood parish.

Final recommendation

Halewood Town Council should comprise 12 councillors, as at present, representing two wards: Halewood North (returning six members) and Halewood South (returning six members). The proposed parish ward boundaries are illustrated and named on Map 1.

33 As a result of our proposed ward boundaries and having regard to the statutory criteria set out in schedule 2 to the 2009 Act, we are providing revised parish electoral arrangements for Knowsley parish.

Final recommendation

Knowsley Town Council should comprise 16 councillors, as at present, representing two wards: Knowsley Park (returning four members) and Stockbridge (returning 12 members). The proposed parish ward boundaries are illustrated and named on Map 1.

34 As a result of our proposed ward boundaries and having regard to the statutory criteria set out in schedule 2 to the 2009 Act, we are providing revised parish electoral arrangements for Prescot parish.

Final recommendation

Prescot Town Council should comprise 17 councillors, as at present, representing two wards: Prescot North (returning 10 members) and Prescot South (returning seven members). The proposed parish ward boundaries are illustrated and named on Map 1.

35 As a result of our proposed ward boundaries and having regard to the statutory criteria set out in schedule 2 to the 2009 Act, we are providing revised parish electoral arrangements for Whiston parish.

Final recommendation

Whiston Town Council should comprise 14 councillors, as at present, representing two wards: Whiston North (returning five members) and Whiston South (returning nine members). The proposed parish ward boundaries are illustrated and named on Map 1.

3 What happens next?

36 We have now completed our review of Knowsley Metropolitan Borough Council. The recommendations must now be approved by Parliament. A draft Order – the legal document which brings into force our recommendations – will be laid in Parliament. Subject to parliamentary scrutiny, the new electoral arrangements will come into force at the local elections in 2016.

Equalities

37 This report has been screened for impact on equalities; with due regard being given to the general equalities duties as set out in section 149 of the Equality Act 2010. As no potential negative impacts were identified, a full equality impact analysis is not required.

Council size	The number of councillors elected to

Electoral Change Order (or Order)	A legal document which implements changes to the electoral arrangements of a local authority
Division	A specific area of a county, defined for electoral, administrative and representational purposes. Eligible electors can vote in whichever division they are registered for the candidate or candidates they wish to represent them on the county council
Electoral fairness	When one elector's vote is worth the same as another's
Electoral inequality	Where there is a difference between the number of electors represented by a councillor and the average for the local authority
Electorate	People in the authority who are registered to vote in elections. For the purposes of this report, we refer specifically to the electorate for local government elections
Number of electors per councillor	The total number of electors in a local authority divided by the number of councillors
Over-represented	Where there are fewer electors per councillor in a ward or division than the average

Parish	A specific and defined area of land within a single local authority enclosed within a parish boundary. There are over 10,000 parishes in England, which provide the first tier of representation to their local residents
Parish council	A body elected by electors in the parish which serves and represents the area defined by the parish boundaries. See also 'Town council'
Parish (or Town) council electoral arrangements	The total number of councillors on any one parish or town council; the number, names and boundaries of parish wards; and the number of councillors for each ward
Parish ward	A particular area of a parish, defined for electoral, administrative and representational purposes. Eligible electors vote in whichever parish ward they live for candidate or candidates they wish to represent them on the parish council
Town council	A parish council which has been given ceremonial 'town' status. More information on achieving such status can be found at <u>www.nalc.gov.uk</u>
Under-represented	Where there are more electors per councillor in a ward or division than the average
Variance (or electoral variance)	How far the number of electors per councillor in a ward or division varies in percentage terms from the average
Ward	A specific area of a district or borough, defined for electoral, administrative and representational purposes. Eligible electors can vote in whichever ward they are registered for the candidate or candidates they wish to represent them on the district or borough council
